Desiree V Cooper Foundation Receives Robert Wood Johnson Grant

WASHINGTON, DC. (February 22, 2022)—The Desiree V. Cooper (DVC) Memorial Scholarship Foundation is pleased to accept the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation President's Grant Fund of the Princeton Area Community Foundation. Promising applicants for the scholarship will have a proven track record of commitment to the community, professional achievements and significant contributions to the field of architecture. The scholarships are awarded to minority candidates who reside in or attended school in Pennsylvania, are residents of Maryland, Virginia or Washington DC, or NOMA members. Applications can be accessed http://www.bit.ly/DVC-ARE-SCHOL, the submission deadline for applications is April 30, 2022. Winners will be notified in May 2022 through email and announced on social media.

Currently, 539 African-American women are licensed to practice architecture in the United States (<u>blackarchitect.us</u>). This number represents only about 0.4% of the total registered architects in the nation. Only 2,445 African-Americans total are licensed in the US. Recognizing the expense of the ARE and study materials can be a barrier for people of color pursuing licensure in architecture, the DVC Memorial Scholarship Foundation created a scholarship to provide financial support and resources to increase the number of women and minority licensed architects.
