"Riding the Vortex" was conceived to inspire students and professionals, to encourage them to establish professional and personal goals, and to provide tools for asking the right questions and for gathering helpful responses quickly.

VORTEX provides opportunities for African-American women to speak and be their true selves in a professional environment which contributes to their well-being and feelings of self-worth; ie, the strength to thrive in the male dominated environments which permeate our profession.

VORTEX provides opportunities for African-American women to formulate an understanding of healthy leadership, to **discover** their unique leadership abilities, and to exercise leadership within various aspects of the profession.

By offering programs in a range of venues, VORTEX actively contributes to greater acceptance of the unique contributions of African-American women and other POC by the majority community and thus is a critical change-agent for our profession.

VORTEX facilitates the establishment of **equitable communities** within all aspects of the profession.

The greatest contribution of VORTEX to the profession has been its direct impact on the exponential increase in the number of African-American women licensed to practice from approximately 175 in 2007 to over 500 by the end of the 3rd quarter of 2020 according to the *Directory of African-American Architects*. When audience learns the many ways the Collaborators and panelists have maneuvered through the architecture education and training maze to achieve licensure, it encourages them to stay on the path to achieving their goals.

The numbers of African-Americans practicing architecture has stagnated at approximately 2% of the profession for a couple of decades. Thirty years ago [1990ish] there were just over 1800 active licensed African-American Architects in the United States. Barely 30 of them were women. As of the date of this submission, of the 2435 African American architects, 533 are women. VORTEX is a major catalyst for the over 254% growth in the number of licensed African American women architects since 2006.














House Location
